
Trees outside Forest (TOF) in INDIA

- Woods from TOF constitute about 85% of the industrial wood consumption of India (< 70 million m³)
- In India "all trees growing outsides government recorded forest areas" are defined as TOF
- TOF mostly grows in agroforests, farm lands, roadside, homesteads, gardens, orchards and urban areas
- The pattern of occurrence is in the form of block plantations/ forests or linear or scattered
- TOF remained as an invisible resource to land use agencies
- The economic value of TOF as industrial wood has not been properly assessed and realized

Need for ToF Certification Standard in INDIA

- Huge production, but no sustainability adherence systems as well as standard for certification
- Indian producers using TOF wood are unable to tap the global market and fetch commensurate price
- Farmers holding most of this resource get adversely affected
- Unstable and inconsistent domestic marketing of TOF products
- Being in private sector, there is a lack of uniformity in silvicultural, management and other operational practices.
- Inadequate mechanism to access the improved and best management practices essential for sustainable management.

NCCF — ToF Certification Standard

- The standard is fully voluntary and not legal
- Is developed for the first time at Global and National level
- Developed through an open, transparent and consultative process
- Holds benefit for tree owners interested in sustainable management and certification
- Simple standard within the reach of small and marginal land holders, without compromising on global benchmarks
- The certification standard is globally aligned but made simple with 28 criteria and 97 indicators for block plantations and only 16 criteria and 51 indicators for scattered trees
- The standard focusses on 6 themes namely legality compliance; management plan and practices; health and vitality; maintenance and enhancement of productivity, socioeconomic responsibility; and conservation and environmental safeguards





Multi-Stakeholder Driven

- Multi-stakeholder participation from timber, plywood and pulp and paper industries, farmer groups, wood suppliers and aggregators, governmental and non-governmental organizations, community organisations, research institutions, technical experts etc.
- Standard was critiqued, reviewed and has undergone changes
- Underwent public consultation and pilot testing in the field
- The themes, criteria and indicators developed are subjected to modification based on local, national and global conditions


